“I’ve got to get away!” Have you ever said that or felt that way? The hectic pace of everyday life often catches up with us. We feel a need to find some solitary place where we may enjoy rest and relaxation. It may be Lutheran Island Camp, a campground, a resort, a trip. A change of pace works wonders. It relaxes the mind and body. It refreshes. One returns to his or her regular duties with renewed zeal and interest.

We read in the fourteenth chapter of the Gospel of Matthew that Jesus and His twelve Apostles needed a change of pace. News of John the Baptist’s murder by Herod had just reached their ears. This news ushered in a new period of Jesus’ ministry. It was time to begin preparing the Disciples for the climax of His earthly mission. To do so, He wished to be alone with them for a time. In Capernaum there was too much hustle and bustle. People were coming and going in their efforts to see Jesus. Under such circumstances it was almost impossible to confer with the Apostles. These men had just returned from their first preaching tour. They were excited and wanted to share their experiences with Jesus, but they were kept so busy that they did not even have a chance to eat. They needed a break. So, Jesus invited them to accompany Him to a quiet place. There they could get some rest and Jesus would have the opportunity to teach them. He took them to a desolate area on the northeastern side of the Sea of Galilee, on a mountainside. We also have need to get away for rest. Our minds and bodies need it. A lot of people reach a stage of burnout simply because they do not rest. They do not take the time to replenish their strength. Every now and then make sure to stop and just breathe for a moment. Taking a break from constant activity is something that can actually keep you energized in the life you live for the Lord.

We need not feel guilty when we seek a solitary place for rest and relaxation. Remember, if Satan can’t defeat you outright, he will settle for an exhausted, ineffective version of the person God wants you to be. Make no mistake about it. God wants His children to rest. When you rest, it allows you to replenish your physical, mental, and emotional strength that keeps you fighting the good fight of faith. In the Book of Psalms, David gives the analogy of a shepherd making his sheep lie down and take a rest. A shepherd would do this in order to make sure his sheep were rested for the journey that was ahead of them. Sometimes the sheep would fight and struggle, but because the shepherd cared for the sheep, he would make them lie down. Just as a shepherd cares for sheep, God cares for you. He knows the journey that lies ahead for you, and He will nudge you when it’s time to rest for a moment. Taking a rest break doesn’t mean you are losing ground; it just means you are getting prepared for the journey ahead into greater things. There is, another kind of rest we need, a rest for the soul. The problems and stresses of day-today living cause us to worry and complain. Then we realize how miserably we have failed to live in a Christ-like manner...to follow Him with a faith that will not shrink though pressed by many a foe. Martin Luther wrote: “He who loses sight of the Word of God, falls into despair; the voice of heaven no longer sustains him; he follows only the disorderly tendency of his heart, and of world vanity, which lead him on to his destruction.”

Our Shepherd is not only concerned about us physically, but all the more spiritually. He restores our soul. The broken heart, the screaming conscience, He comes to heal. Jesus says clearly what His chief work would be as our Good Shepherd—to lay down His life only to take it up again. The forgiveness of sins that Jesus has won for us by His death and proved by His resurrection is the ultimate in soul restoration. The needed relief and renewed strength for our souls is given to us in the Means of Grace: the Word and Sacraments. In Jesus, who in love for us gave His life as a ransom for all our sins, we receive rest and restoration. He is our Savior and Good Shepherd who provides for all our needs of body and soul. (Jesus said) **"Come to Me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest"** (Matthew 11:28).

In all the strife Of mortal life Our feet will stand securely; Temptation’s hour will lose its pow’r, For You will guard us surely. O God, renew with heav’nly dew Our body, soul and spirit Until we stand at Your right hand Through Jesus’ saving merit. LSB 714 v. 3

Since the cost of lumber is so prohibitive, a quote was seen from Jamar Corporation on resealing the existing roof instead of going with rafters. Jamar representatives inspected the roof and recommended a fiber silicone sealcoat. If the proposal is accepted, they would be resealing the roof next month (August).

A review of the quote will be discussed following worship on June 27th at coffee hour. Copies of the proposal are available at church for review.
